# The display at Mitcham Library

We installed our first display in the foyer of the Mitcham Library on August 1<sup>st</sup>. For the rest of the month visitors can see the row of striking fluorescent Orange Ladies 'playing' between the black and white information panels. The display describes the broad aims and goals of Zonta and shines a light on the work being done by volunteers. It includes some of the history behind Zonta and how passionate people come to spearhead campaigns that work for changes in law and in society.

The display is also a way to introduce our club to the local community, even though the club began 35 years ago, our work is often done quietly behind the scenes. So, it's great to be a bit more visual.

In the display we have linked the goals and achievements of Zonta International to some of activities specific to our club, as follows:

- Birthing Kits provide a safe birth for mother and child and education for Traditional Birthing assistants in third world conditions. It is now linked to a panel about international action.
- Getting Started Buckets are a kit to help women embark on a

- new beginning after either having a baby without support and/or fleeing domestic abuse. Linked to Service.
- The Expect Respect Project supports education in schools for young people to learn about respectful relationships before poor attitudes around gender equality develops. It combines teachers, experts, and the local community to create a wholistic learning experience. It has been running in Mount Barker schools since 2012 and hopefully will begin here soon. Linked to advocacy and service.

We have an article hopefully going in the next issue of the Blackwood Times. In that, we hope they will include a photo of the three elected members of our area who met Susie, Sue and me at the display on Thursday (see photos below). It was lovely to share some thoughts and our goals with them and also celebrate this moment in time.

Raising awareness of the importance and benefits of gender equality is a major part of what Zonta does. It is momentous that this year in our local community a woman is represented in all three levels of government.

# Dinner meeting 27th July 2022 with guest speaker Jenny Tilly Scott

Jenny Tilly Scott is a retired archivist and her topic was Women in Politics in South Australia. She spoke about the politician Jessie Mary Cooper (1914– 1993).

Jessie's husband was Geoffrey Day Thomas Cooper, of the prominent Adelaide brewing family a director of Cooper & Sons Ltd.

She was a member of the Liberal and Country League (LCL), and by 1948 was a member of the State Executive Council. She won the first position on her party's ticket for a safe LCL seat representing Central No. 2.

A disgruntled LCL member took legal action, claiming that Cooper and her Australian Labor Party (ALP) rival. Margaret Scott, were not 'persons' under the 1934 Constitution Act. After a hearing that attracted great public interest, in late February 1959, the Supreme Court of South Australia returned the decision to the Parliament, which confirmed the eligibility of women to seek election.

On 7 March, nearly sixty-five years after women gained the right to vote in South Australia, Cooper and her LCL colleague Jovce Steele became the first women elected to the State Parliament.

For sixteen of her twenty years in Parliament, she would be the only woman in the Legislative Council.

Jenny also spoke about Joyce Steele (29 May 1909 – 24 September 1991) who was one of the first two women elected to the Parliament of South Australia, the other being Jessie Cooper.

Steele was elected to the House of Assembly and Cooper was elected to the Legislative Council at the 1959 election. Ironically, while South Australian women had been given the right to vote and stand for election—a right they had gained at the 1896 election —South Australia had been the last State to elect a female representative.

Jenny spoke about Molly Byrne who was Labor's first female elected to the Parliament of South Australia at the 1965 election, and the third ahead of Steele and Cooper.

Jenny, also referred to <u>Damned Whores</u> and God's Police (1975) by Summers. The book explores Australian history by placing women at its centre.

## Adolescent Girls' Health and Protection In Peru

US\$750,000

UNICEF USA

GOAL:

Improve the capacity of services to respond to the health needs of adolescents, in particular adolescent girls, in a timely manner and prevent all forms of violence in schools and other services.

#### Her Health and Dignity, Our Priority in Papua New Guinea and Timor-Leste UNFPA

US\$750.000

GOAL:

All women and girls in Papua New Guinea and Timor-Leste live life free from violence.

Gender-based violence (GBV) is an umbrella term for any harmful act that is perpetrated against a person's will and that is based on socially ascribed differences between males and females. It includes acts that inflict physical, sexual and mental harm or suffering, threats of such acts, coercion and other deprivation of liberty. These acts can occur in public or in private.

# Engaging Girls on Climate Change in Madagascar

US\$500,000

UNICEF USA

GOAL:

Support girls and a generation of children and adolescents by providing environmental education in Madagascar through child-friendly schools.

This project will help UNICEF enable children, particularly girls, to learn in safe and inclusive environment and empower them to take actions to change and to build climate-resilient communities. The targeted beneficiaries are more than 1,000 students (approximately 540 girls), 750 teachers, and residents of school communities in Beloha and Ambovombe districts in the region of Androy, the drought-prone region of the South.

Approximately 119,000 students (including 66,000 girls) and 1,500 teachers at 700 primary schools will indirectly impact from school health and environmental action plans

#### Global Programme to End Child Marriage

US\$1,200,000

UNFPA and UNICEF via UNICEF USA GOAL:

Scale up the Global Programme's activities to protect and empower girls, and ultimately help bring an end to the practice of child marriage.

The program's priority is engaging adolescent girls as key agents of change in the following 12 countries with high prevalence of child marriage: Bangladesh, Burkina Faso, Ethiopia, Ghana, India, Mozambique, Nepal, Niger, Sierra Leone, Uganda, Yemen and Zambia.
