I will be holding a Sewing Day on Friday 4th November at my home if you'd like to come. We'll be making bags and shields for the Days for Girls project.

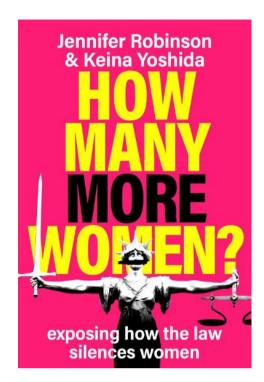
It's from 10am or whatever time suits you, please BYO lunch. There will be some non-

In this powerful and accessible exploration of our legal systems, two human rights lawyers break open the big judgments, developments and trends that have and continue to silence and disadvantage women.

HOW MANY MORE WOMEN

- Have to be raped or abused before we act?
- Need to accuse him before we believe her?
- Will be failed by the criminal justice system?
- Need to say something before we do something?
- Will be sued for defamation for speaking out?
- Will be contracted to silence?

From two internationally acclaimed lawyers comes a masterful and urgent exploration of the legal response to the MeToo movement in Australia and around the world.

We are in a crucial moment; women are breaking through the cultural reticence to speak out about gender-based violence. But as they have grown empowered to speak, a new form of systematic silencing has become more evident: the spike in survivors speaking out has been followed by a spike in legal actions against them and the media

The law is being wielded to reinforce the status quo of silence that existed before MeToo.

We cannot act if we do not know. If women cannot speak about their abuse - and journalists are fearful of telling their stories - then how can we understand the problem of gender-based violence in our society? And how can we even begin to end it?

In How Many More Women? Jennifer Robinson and Dr Keina Yoshida examine the laws around the world that silence women, and explore the changes we need to make to ensure that women's freedoms are no longer threatened by the legal system that is supposed to protect them.

Jennifer Robinson is an Australian human rights lawyer and feminist, who is internationally recognised for her work. She represented Amber Heard in relation to Johnny Depp's 2020 defamation case in the UK and has defended Julian Assange and advised WikiLeaks since 2010. She is a practicing barrister at Doughty Street Chambers in London and has acted in key human rights, freedom of speech and information cases before the British courts, international and regional courts, and UN special mechanisms.

Dr Keina Yoshidais a human rights lawyer, media lawyer and feminist. Keina is a lawyer with the Center for Reproductive Rights and was a practicing human rights barrister at Doughty Street Chambers where they are currently an associate tenant. Keina has acted in key human rights cases including on LGBTI rights, and women's rights. Keina is a visiting fellow at the Centre for Women, Peace and Security, at the London School of Economics.

Celebrating diversity in your club

Not everyone will celebrate the same holidays. Develop a cultural calendar and join in on the festive days. Build new traditions while driving more visibility to the differences represented in the members of your club and community. Also, be respectful of observed days that are more somber.



3. Build a learning environment.

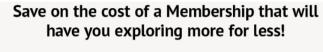
Keep an open mind and let expression grow in a brave space. From attending cultural events such as book clubs, musical performances, art showings or film screenings to hosting guest speakers – there is an opportunity to highlight the journeys people across the globe take in their lives. While not all paths are the same, the spirit and heart of encouraging and supporting others are universal.



4. Be mindful of barriers.

Differences in language can be frightening to people as they do not want to misspeak in their second or third language. Try to avoid jargon or phrases that do not translate well or could be misunderstood as offensive. Generational barriers can also prevent the easiest flow of communication. Offer trainings to get members on the same platform or remind the group to communicate in ways where everyone can get the message. Utilizing different translation tools, which you can find on our Translations Toolkit, will help share information without causing excessive confusion.
